



FAMILY ENVIRONMENT AND INDIVIDUAL EMOTIONAL STABILITY

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Abstract

Analyzing this topic makes it possible to identify the role of psychological factors in the process of family upbringing, the importance of emotional support, and ways to create a healthy psychological environment.

Literature review

The issue of family environment and an individual's emotional stability is one of the most widely studied and relevant areas in modern psychological science. Representatives of various scientific schools have analyzed the role of the family in a person's emotional development from different theoretical perspectives. According to the "attachment theory" developed by the foreign psychologist John Bowlby, the early emotional bond between a child and parents determines the individual's later emotional stability and response to stress. He argued that children who develop secure attachment tend to have a higher level of emotional balance and social adaptation. Albert Bandura, in his social learning theory, emphasizes that children acquire emotional reactions through observation and imitation within the family. In this process, parents' behavior serves as a model for the child. Similarly, Erik Erikson substantiated that in the psychosocial stages of personality development, the family environment plays a decisive role in the formation of emotional qualities such as trust, independence, and self-esteem. In the CIS psychological school, Lev Vygotsky explains personality development as being closely interconnected with the social environment. According to him, communication and cooperative processes within the family directly influence a child's emotional and cognitive development. V. Sukhomlinsky referred to the family as the "first school" of a person's emotional development, emphasizing that an environment based on affection and support plays a key role in forming a child's psychological stability.



In the works of Uzbek psychologists E. G‘oziev, V. Karimova, G‘.Shoumarov, M. Fayziyeva, D. Baratova, M. Turobova, and D. Karimova, scientific research has been conducted on the topic of family relationships.

E. G‘oziev studied the relationship between family upbringing and emotional development, and scientifically proved that the psychological climate in parent–child relationships directly affects an individual’s stress resistance and emotional stability.

V. Karimova, in turn, demonstrated that communication within the family environment, emotional support, and parenting styles are important factors in shaping a person’s self-confidence and psychological balance.

Modern research also confirms the impact of the family environment on emotional stability. According to scientific findings, individuals raised in warm and supportive families are better at managing stress, have higher social adaptability, and are emotionally more stable. In contrast, a conflictual and unstable family environment may lead to emotional instability, anxiety, and increased psychological pressure.

G‘. Shoumarov’s research substantiates that the psychological environment within the family directly influences personality development. In particular, emotional stability, mutual respect, and harmony within the family are identified as important factors in the formation of a child’s personality. Conversely, family conflicts and emotional instability may cause stress, anxiety, and difficulties in social adaptation.

His scientific approach also examines the national-psychological characteristics of Uzbek families. According to him, motivations for marriage, attitudes toward marriage, and family values play an important role in personality development. Studies show that attitudes toward children and parental values in Uzbek families are among the key factors determining family stability.

In the scientific research of Makhbuba Alisherovna Turobova, the system of family relations, socio-psychological readiness of young people, and adaptation to family life processes have been deeply studied. Her research analyzes, based on statistical data, the interrelationship between students’ readiness for family relationships, emotional intelligence, and psychological stability. The results show that the family environment and social support system have a direct impact on an individual’s emotional stability.



Dilafroz Olimjonovna Baratova has focused her scientific work on social psychology, family relationships, and personality development issues. Her research is aimed at studying changes in modern family systems and their impact on the psychology of children and young people. One of her key research areas is the socio-psychological characteristics of child upbringing in single-parent families. This study analyzes emotional state, self-esteem, social adaptation, and psychological development features of children raised in such families. The results indicate that children growing up in single-parent families may experience higher levels of emotional instability, anxiety, and social insecurity.
